

Biographies

Ashley Brown graduated from Liverpool Medical School. He undertook postgraduate training in hepatology in Newcastle-upon-Tyne where he was awarded an MD for research into the pharmacogenetics of alcohol metabolism. He worked as a consultant on liver units in Australia and the UK before taking up his current position at Imperial College Healthcare in 2002. He has a major clinical interest in viral hepatitis and is currently conducting a number of studies into novel therapies for HBV and HCV.

Simon Calvert is a consultant in Emergency & Critical Care Medicine at King's College Hospital, London. His interests include recognition and management of the acutely unwell hospital patient, healthcare informatics, and the development of high-reliability teams. He studied medicine in Edinburgh and completed post-graduate training in London.

James Coutts trained at Oxford University Medical School, with medical qualification in 1989. He became a member of the Royal College of Physicians by examination in 1992, and subsequently a fellow in 2006. After training in general medicine he undertook three years' training in Intensive care, before specialising in cardiology. He was appointed consultant cardiologist at Guy's and St Thomas' Hospitals in 2002. He has a specialist interest in coronary intervention (angiography and angioplasty for ischaemic heart disease), in addition to working in general cardiology and general medicine.

Martin Fisher is a consultant in HIV/GUM at Brighton and Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust. He is responsible for the outpatient and inpatient management of a large cohort of HIV-infected individuals, and leads an active research team. He is currently an Executive Committee member of the British HIV Association, a member of the HIV Special Interest Group of the British Association for Sexual Health and HIV, and is an examiner and former Convenor of the national Diploma in HIV Medicine. He was co-chair of the 2008 UK HIV Testing guidelines, as well as being a member of numerous other guidelines committees. His main clinical and research interests are in antiretroviral therapy, primary HIV infection, strategies to improve the diagnosis of HIV infection, HIV and hepatitis co-infection, and the interplay between HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.

Ian Gabriel holds a joint consultant post at both Chelsea and Westminster and Imperial College NHS healthcare trusts. He trained at St Mary's Hospital Paddington and completed his haematology training in London. In 2008 he was awarded the Frank Cass Scholarship to pursue research into the role of killer immunoglobulin receptors in post-transplant tumour eradication and haematopoietic reconstitution, and graft versus host reactions, in the laboratory of Professor K Rezvani. His main interest is in haemato-oncology and stem cell transplantation. He is a member of both the acute leukaemia and lymphoma working parties of the European Blood and Marrow Transplant Group (EBMT) and a founder member of the European Consortium for Stem Cell Mobilisation (ECOSM). His areas of particular interest are transplantation for cutaneous T-cell lymphomas, late effects of transplant and post-transplant immunology. Ian has a strong interest in the haematological complications of HIV infection and was part of the EBMT group which demonstrated efficacy and safety of autologous stem cell transplant in HIV-positive patients with relapsed lymphoma. He runs a newly created HIV-haematology joint clinic at Chelsea and Westminster.

Yvonne Gilleece is a consultant in HIV & Genitourinary Medicine at Brighton & Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust and an honorary senior lecturer at Sussex University. She is the Lead for HIV in Pregnancy and Hepatitis B as well as a clinical supervisor for a PhD on HIV and Bone. She is a member of the BASHH HIV SIG and is an author on the BHIVA guidelines for hepatitis, HIV-2 and the most recent guidelines on HIV in pregnancy.

Elizabeth Hamlyn is a consultant physician in HIV and Sexual Health at King's College Hospital, London. She has responsibility for HIV inpatients, outpatients and adolescent HIV transition services.

Paul Holmes is a consultant neurologist at Guy's and St Thomas' Hospital and an honorary senior lecturer at King's College London. His main work is providing an acute liaison neurology service during which time he has developed an interest in the neurology of HIV infection, intensive care neurology and stroke.

Katharine Hurt is a respiratory physician at Brighton and Sussex University Hospital. Her specialist interests include cystic fibrosis, bronchiectasis, respiratory infection and non-tuberculous mycobacterial disease.

Rachael Jones is a consultant in HIV and Sexual Health at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, London. Her major interests are the medical complications of HIV and she runs a combined HIV/renal service with a consultant nephrologist. She has been involved in writing local and national guidelines on HIV and sexual health.

Biographies

Ranjababu (Babu) Kulasegaram is a consultant in HIV/GU medicine at St Thomas' Hospital and leads the HIV Treatment Advice Clinic with special interests in HIV/hepatitis, haemophilia/HIV infection and HIV inpatient management. He is Training Programme Director for the SpRs and is committed to enhancing BHIVA's educational activities through his involvement as a member of the BHIVA Educational and Scientific Subcommittee and E-Learning Working Group. Babu is also Chair of the BHIVA Hepatitis Society.

Jeremy Levy is a consultant nephrologist at Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust (ICHT), Reader in Renal Medicine and Medical Education for Imperial College London, and Director of Education and Quality for Health Education North West London. He trained in Cambridge, London and Oxford. He has major clinical and research interests in immune-mediated renal disease (vasculitis, SLE and other glomerulonephritides), HIV and kidney disease and chronic kidney disease, and has written textbooks on dialysis, nephrology and academic medicine.

Farhat Kazmi is a consultant radiologist at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital. Dr Kazmi has extensive experience of imaging in HIV and general medicine patients at the trust. There is a large caseload of HIV-positive patients at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital and Dr Kazmi has published many interesting case series.

Rob Miller is Reader in Clinical Infection at University College London (UCL), Honorary Professor at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, and Honorary Consultant at Camden Provider Services NHS Trust and UCL Hospitals NHS Trust. Rob's research interests relate to the effects of HIV on innate immunity and the respiratory complications of HIV infection, particularly *Pneumocystis jirovecii* pneumonia and tuberculosis.

Mark Nelson is a consultant physician at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, London. He trained at Jesus College, Cambridge and Westminster Hospital Medical School from where he qualified in 1986. He was appointed consultant physician at this hospital in 1991 and a senior lecturer at Imperial College Medical School in 1996. Since that time he has built a large HIV practice with a special interest in HIV inpatient care, co-infection with hepatitis B and C, and the clinical utility of new antiretroviral agents. Dr Nelson sits on the Executive Committee of the British HIV Association where he is co-chair of the guidelines committee for opportunistic infections and the treatment of hepatitis C. He is a member of the guidelines committees for malignancy and hepatitis co-infection. He was chair of the BHIVA Hepatitis Working Group and is the newly elected chair of the BHIVA Education and Scientific Subcommittee. He is a trustee of several charities associated with HIV including the International Association of Physicians in AIDS care (IAPAC) and St Stephen's AIDS Trust, a charity committed to the improvement of life for all those living with HIV, where he is head of overseas development and education. As such, he leads on doctor exchanges and educational projects in several African and Asian countries. He has been awarded a visiting professorship at the Aga Khan Hospital, Nairobi, Kenya and most recently the Certificate of Merit by the government of Vietnam.

Ian Reeves is Lead Consultant for HIV at the Homerton University Hospital.

Andrew Ustianowski is a consultant in Infectious Diseases at the Monsall Regional Infection Unit, Manchester, which has a cohort of just under 2000 HIV-positive patients. He has been part of guideline writing committees for BHIVA and other bodies, and has given regional and national lectures on HIV and related topics. His main clinical interests are in HIV and tropical medicine.

John Walsh has worked at St Mary's Hospital and Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust as a consultant in HIV & Sexual Health since 2001. He is a member of the BHIVA treatment guidelines writing committee and is an examiner for the Dip HIV.

Laura Waters is a new GU/HIV consultant at the Mortimer Market Centre, London, working predominantly in HIV out-patient and in-patient services. She completed specialist training in 2006 then worked in clinical trials at Chelsea & Westminster and Brighton, recently completing an MD on the simplification and switch of antiretrovirals. She has published and presented widely on topics including drug toxicity and contraception for HIV-positive women and was on the writing committee for the 2012 BHIVA treatment guidelines.

John Watson has been a consultant in Sexual Health and HIV at Birmingham Heartlands Hospital since 2010. Dr Watson qualified from the University of Liverpool in 1995 and has a keen interest in inpatient care. He has previously worked at Mayday University Hospital and St George's Hospital in London.



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
