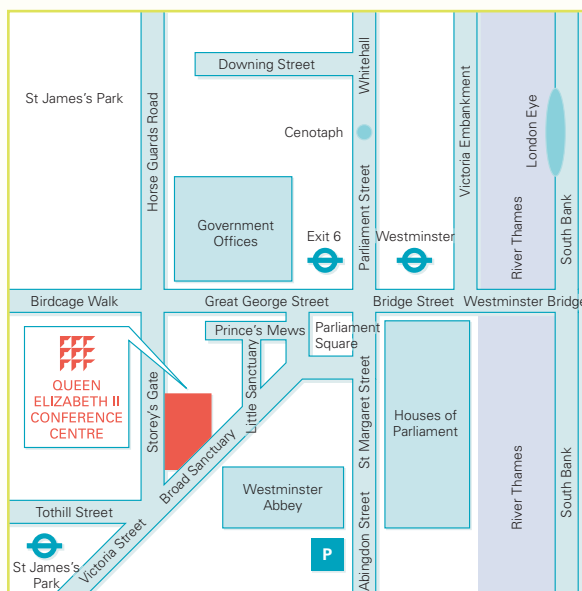
Conference Venue

The conference venue is a short walk from Westminster or St. James's Park Underground stations. Please see the map for the location of these stations in relation to the **Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre**.

Westminster and St. James's Park Underground stations are easily accessible from King's Cross, St Pancras (Eurostar) and Victoria mainline rail stations and can be accessed by the Jubilee line or the Circle & District line. The journey from these mainline stations to Westminster or St James's Park Underground stations takes approximately 10 minutes and costs approximately £4.

There are also good links to the city centre from both Heathrow Airport and Gatwick Airport. Journeys by either Heathrow or Gatwick Express take about 1 hour.

Biographies

Sarah Allstaff is Consultant in Genitourinary Medicine for NHS Tayside and based at Ninewells Hospital in Dundee. She is the local lead for HIV prevention. Sarah sits on the board of NHS Tayside's Sexual Health and Blood Borne Virus Managed Care Network for which she chairs the HIV sub-group and co-chairs the prevention sub-group. Sarah is secretary for the Scottish HIV and Aids Group Committee.

Jane Anderson is from Homerton University Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, Barts and the London School of Medicine & Dentistry and University College London, and works as a clinician and researcher in HIV medicine in East London. Her work focuses on the needs of ethnic minority and migrant populations in relation to HIV in the UK. She is particularly interested in HIV care for women and families. She is a previous Chair of the British HIV Association (BHIVA) and is currently on a part time secondment to Public Health England.

David Asboe is a Consultant in HIV Medicine and Sexual Health at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, London. He has been a trustee on the Executive Committee of the British HIV Association since 2005 and was elected BHIVA Chair in 2013. He is also the convenor of the Diploma HIV Medicine exam.

Christine Bowman Christine is a Consultant Physician in Genitourinary Medicine and Clinical Director for the Academic Directorates of Communicable Diseases & Specialised Medicine at Sheffield Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. She is also Co-Lead for South Yorkshire HIV Network and the Yorkshire & Humber member of the National Clinical Reference Group for HIV.

Sharon Byrne is Co-Chair of the HIV Pharmacy Association (HIVPA) and a Trustee of UK Foundation for AIDS Research (UKFAR).

Garry Brough Garry works for Terrence Higgins Trust as Membership & Involvement Officer and Service Lead for myHIV.org.uk, the largest network of people living with HIV in the UK. He has been living with HIV for 24 years and has worked in HIV support, self-management and patient involvement since founding the Bloomsbury Patients Network in 1999. Garry is a community representative on the BHIVA Executive Committee and NHS England's HIV Clinical Reference Group.

Breda Flaherty is Director of BFA Development, with a twenty year track record in organisation development, leadership and project management across the health & social care field. She is a skilled and experienced facilitator of complex delegate groups, where people are often drawn from multiple services and settings, and need to address issues of controversy or complexity in a constructive way to achieve a productive outcome. Breda is MSc. Course Director in Leadership and Commissioning in the Postgraduate Division of Brighton and Sussex Medical School, where she leads on Developing Effective Commissioners and on Clinical Leadership. At national level Breda is one of the Kings Fund's twenty national Leadership Associates, where she leads on medical & clinical leadership.

She has an MSc in Leadership and Management in Healthcare with Brighton University and was in NHS London's Prepare to Lead cohort of 2010/11. Biographies

Derek Macallan is a specialist in adult infectious diseases. His special interests include HIV infection and tuberculosis. He has a regular HIV outpatient clinic at St George's Healthcare, as well as a specialist clinic for patients who have both HIV and tuberculosis. Professor Macallan qualified from the University of Oxford and the London Hospital Medical College in 1983. He completed a PhD on the nutritional and metabolic complications of chronic infection at St George's medical school in 1994. He went on to train in general internal medicine and infectious diseases in London and is on the specialist register for both specialties. He completed a diploma in tropical medicine and hygiene in 1998. Professor Macallan has been an honorary consultant physician at St George's Healthcare since 1998 and was made a professor at St George's, University of London in 2007.

Esther McDonnell trained as an occupational therapist at the University of Sydney graduating in 2004. She has worked in the field of HIV since then, including acute hospital wards, community rehabilitation and a long term care facility. She currently works in a specialist HIV post at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital. Esther has presented work at international and national HIV and occupational therapy conferences regarding the role of OT and rehabilitation in HIV. Esther has been the Chair of the Rehabilitation and HIV Association (RHIVA) since 2013.

Alexander Margetts has worked as a Clinical Psychologist in HIV and sexual health at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital for the past 6 years, and is also currently the Chair of the British Psychological Society (BPS) Faculty for HIV & Sexual Health. Therapeutically he works predominately from a Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) background, and also leads on Neuropsychology for the service. Alongside clinical work, his role includes service development, supervision, teaching, training, and consultation.

Vikki Pearce is Director of Vikki Pearce Consulting. As an experienced programme manager and facilitator, Vikki has a strong track record in achieving the challenge of developing relationships around complex and controversial issues, negotiating for change, and building agreement on goals and processes. Vikki is a service redesign and commissioning specialist, with expertise in developing commissioning approaches to sexual health, including the development of a new funding tariff. She has successfully led the redesign of sexual health services in Tower Hamlets, and Programme Managed the large-scale Sexual Health Modernisation Initiative (SHMI) across SE London.

Jill Swan is the Acting Lead Directorate Pharmacist for HIV/GUM at Chelsea and Westminster NHS Foundation Trust and has worked within the field of HIV and sexual health for approximately 5 years. She is a member of the HIVPA Committee as Lead for Mentorship and Training.

Fiona Thompson is a Consultant Paediatrician in Northampton with interests in Paediatric HIV and Neonatology. She has been a member of the CHIVA Executive Committee since 2011 with responsibility for commissioning since 2012, and a representative of CHIVA on the HIV CRG since 2012 and chair of the Paediatric/Obstetric subgroup of the CRG. In 2014 she has jointly undertaken a review of the Children's HIV National Network (CHINN) to update the CRG and commissioners.
